Dentures

Almost can't be distinguished from the real thing

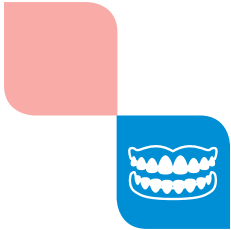
With an extensive range of types and colours of teeth and molars as well as modern techniques, it is currently even possible to create a prosthesis with which the outside world will barely notice that you wear a prosthesis. It is even possible to have each tooth coloured according to your own preferences. In addition, you can choose from resin or porcelain teeth and molars. The "gums" of the prosthesis no longer need to be made completely of pink resin. For a natural appearance, we try to copy your natural gums as closely as possible. We do this by replacing the visible pink resin with resin in colours that resemble your own gums.

The palate can also be made out of transparent resin. This is entirely more appealing. All your personal preferences will be discussed with you, after which you, prior to the treatment, will receive a quote. After your agreement, the follow-up appointments will be scheduled.

Having trouble with your dentures?

Make an appointment at the practice.

Do you recognise one of the complaints below?

- Pain in the mouth while chewing;
- Food under your prosthesis;
- The prosthesis tilts and slides over the gums;
- Presence of significantly worn teeth and molars;
- Drooping corners of the mouth and sunken-in mouth;
- Loose-fitting dentures;
- Trouble with spittle coming out of your mouth.

Then you are advised to quickly make a check-up appointment in order to see whether the complaints can be helped by a repair. Or it may be time to replace your prosthesis.

We would like to see you every year for a check-up.

1. Intake discussion/1st impression

The first impression of your jaws will be made.

2. Final impressions

With the help of custom-made scoops, the final impressions of the jaw parts will be made. With this, the correct edge length and the shape of the prostheses will be determined. During this visit, the choice of the teeth to be used will also be made with you. Colour and shape will be selected. If you have photos from your past and you would like your new dentures to resemble those, it is advisable to bring them along.

3. Bite determination

It will be determined how the jaws are positioned with respect to each other and how much space there is in the mouth for the dental prosthesis. The first set-up of the 6 front teeth in the top prosthesis will be assessed for shape, colour and placement. Your personal preferences will always be taken into account.

4. Test prosthesis

An examination will be done of whether the teeth fit nicely into your mouth and whether the molars come together well. The teeth and molars are mounted on a wax plate, meaning that the shape of the prosthesis will not yet be optimal.

5. Placing of the prosthesis

The prosthesis will be placed in the mouth and checked for aesthetics, pain points and your ability to speak. You can start to use your prosthesis now. The process of getting accustomed to the prosthesis can last a few weeks.

6. Follow-up check

Your caregiver will make an appointment to check the new prosthesis. The entire prosthesis will be examined, and small irregularities or pain points will be removed. We assume that after this period, you have already become reasonably accustomed to your new prosthesis.

After this last check, we would like to see you every year for a check-up. Note that this is also important for the warranty of your prosthesis.
